

Fear Not

Easier said than done. There is so much to be afraid of today: war; the loss of life and the devastation caused by it; unemployment and poverty; illness and the pain and diminishment that often accompany it; the threat of ecological collapse; to say nothing of personal anxiety and trauma. The readings for this Sunday all speak of the hardships that loom over every life.

But these hardships are not the last word. Jeremiah ends his announcement of gloom on a positive note: "Praise the LORD, / For he has rescued the life of the poor / from the power of the evildoers!" (Jeremiah 20:13). The psalm of lament picks up the same message: "the LORD hears the poor" (Psalm 69:34).

Saint Paul insists that sin and death don't win: "...How much more did the grace of God...overflow for the many" (Romans 5:15). Caught in the throes of misfortune, people cry out—but God responds.

It is in the Gospel that the reassurance of God's care unfolds. The struggles described there are real, but they will not last. The imagery employed to characterize God's care is picturesque and extraordinarily tender. If God is attentive to the lowly sparrows, how much more will God be attentive to us? Even more personally, God knows us so well that the very hairs on our head are counted. The admonition here is clear: Never fear! If catastrophes threaten, don't be afraid! Even if they engulf you or carry you away, don't be afraid. It is only temporary. God is always there, attentive to our needs, so fear not!



Registering to attend Mass - ***Please note change below***

St. Bernard's weekend Masses are Saturdays @ 4 PM and Sundays at 11 AM. Currently, Masses attendance numbers are restricted to 50 maximum following all the required guidelines.

Those who are 70 years of age or older, or who have medical or at-risk conditions, should carefully assess the risk when making the decision to attend Mass.

The dispensation (permission to be exempted from the laws or observances of the Church) of the Sunday precept ("You shall attend Mass on Sundays...# 2042 - Catechism of the Catholic Church) is extended for those who cannot go to church, inviting them to read the Word of God and pray in their homes and participate in the celebrations of the Mass Via the media (TV, radio, the internet).

To attend a Mass...you must register

Update: A rolling list will not be kept. To reserve a spot for Mass, you must **call the parish office at 857-0425, Monday or Thursday between the hours of 9 AM to 2 PM.** (phones not answered from 12 - 1) When registering indicate your preference of a Saturday or Sunday Mass, & how many person(s) will attend. Your will then be given a date as to the Mass you may attend based on the allowed numbers.

Reservations outside of these hours will not be taken.

As you can imagine there is a great deal of work involved in taking reservations for Masses.

We ask for your continued patience as we navigate this new normal.

Elevator will not be available.

Social distancing of 6 feet is still essential.

Entrance and exit doors - only the **main doors on Botsford St. will be used.**

Doors will be clearly identified. No other doors are to be used.

Registered attendance will be checked upon entrance

Sanitizing - you will be given a squirt of sanitizer when you enter the church.

You will be ushered to your reserved seat.

No procession at the beginning or end of Mass.

No singing allowed by the congregation. No song books in the pews.

Holy Water Fonts - will remain empty.

Parish contributions. Donation basket will be placed at the entrance of the church.

Sign of Peace: No handshaking. Extend sign of peace with a smile, nod, etc.

Communion: The individual dialogue of Communion (The Body of Christ. Amen) will be done **collectively after the response "Lord I am not worthy..."**, followed by the distribution of Communion in **SILENCE.**

Communion procession: The community will be directed / guided as to how to process up for communion. **Social distancing of 6 feet must be respected.**

At the end of Mass: the faithful will be asked **not leave the church at the sametime** as to avoid creating grouping. Leave the church according to a fixed order, respecting the rules of social distancing. (again you will be directed how to exit.)

The faithful are to avoid grouping or contacts among themselves or with the priest before or after services in or outside the church or in the parking lot.

Please be patient as we implement these new measures. God bless all.



With restrictions being lifted by the provincial government, allowing us to gather once again as faith community, with a maximum of 50 in attendance, we are in need of volunteers.

1. There must be a person checking people in & having them answer the Covid-19 questions.
2. There must be someone just inside the door supplying all in attendance with hand sanitizer.
3. There must be volunteers inside the church escorting people to their seats, while respecting social distancing.
4. The church must be disinfected following every liturgy.



Dear Padre,

Why does the Church oppose stem-cell research, especially when it has the potential to cure illnesses like Parkinson's disease?

Stem cells are unspecialized cells with the ability to divide and produce a variety of more specialized cells. Scientists hope that one day they can be coaxed into specific kinds of cells that can cure disease or repair diseased organs.

In its 2008 statement On Embryonic Stem Cell Research, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops noted that there are two kinds of stem cells. Adult stem cells come from umbilical cord blood, adult tissue, and placenta. The bishops say they "can be obtained without harm to the donor and without any ethical problem."

Embryonic stem cells, on the other hand, are obtained by destroying embryonic human beings in the first days of development. Since harvesting these cells involves the deliberate killing of humans, obtaining or using this kind of cell is immoral. This is why the Church has opposed extending federally funded stem-cell research beyond currently existing cell lines.

Although stem-cell research may hold vast therapeutic potential, it's never permissible to sacrifice a human being for the good of others. The bishops clarify the moral hazards when they say, "The same ethic that justifies taking some lives to help the patient with Parkinson's or Alzheimer's disease today can be used to sacrifice that very patient tomorrow, if his or her survival is viewed as disadvantageous to other human beings considered more deserving or productive."

Catholics should support further research on adult stem cells, which show great promise, and resist efforts to expand research using embryonic cells.
